



Nursery – Changes

Nursery have been learning about different changes that we can see all around us. We began by having fun with colour mixing and making many new colours all by ourselves.



We LOVED exploring mixing different coloured water and even changed our water to perfume by adding herbs and scented plants from our garden.



We soon noticed signs of Spring and we became “Spring Detectives” as we began to notice that new flowers and plants had started to grow. We ticked them off on a sheet when we had found them. This moved our learning on to looking at ourselves and how much we have grown from being a baby and what has changed about us too!



We had some of our mummies in with their babies so we could compare the differences between the babies and us.



The babies had no teeth, couldn't walk or talk and had no hair either; we found this so funny! We realised how much we have changed now we have grown and are in Nursery.



We are excited to see what happens to our vegetable plants, strawberry plants and fruit bushes.



What a lot of different ways we have learnt about 'Changes We Can See' in Nursery this half term.

Reception – Are Eggs Alive?

This term in Reception, we asked the question 'Are Eggs Alive?' We were very excited to watch chicks hatch and grow.



We learnt about lots of different animals that come from eggs. Did you know that snakes, frogs, butterflies and penguins all come from eggs? We decided that some eggs are alive, but not the eggs we eat for breakfast! We also found out that some animals don't come from eggs, these animals are called mammals and they come from their mummy's body. Mammals can feed their babies milk too. We also learnt about animals and their young. Lots of animals are born in the springtime; it's a time for new life. We found out that lots of animals live on farms. We met some farm animals during our very exciting trip to Bocketts Farm.



It was a super fun day, and we couldn't wait to get there! We were very impressed with the big yellow coach and we liked looking out of the window to see the woods and the countryside. We met all the lovely farmers when we arrived who helped us to learn about the animals. We used very gentle hands to stroke rabbits, guinea pigs and a rat with pink eyes! We went on a tractor ride that went all the way around the farm. We saw pigs, goats, horses, cows and sheep. The ride made us laugh because it was so bumpy! We also went into the animal barn and saw the baby lambs and piglets; they were very cute. Some of us were very brave and fed the sheep; we had to use flat hands so that the sheep could lick the food off our hands - their tongues were tickly.



It was lots of fun but totally disgusting! 🐏 Before we had our lunch, we washed our hands thoroughly so that any germs from the animals didn't make us sick. After lunch we could play! This was exciting and we had so much fun exploring with our friends. We went down huge

slides, swung from ropes and climbed on the soft play. We had a wonderful time and didn't want the fun to end. Lots of us fell asleep on the coach. Phew! What an exciting and busy day! All your children did us proud? They were beautifully behaved, listened carefully to instructions and they were very polite to each other and the grown-ups. Great job everyone! A big thank you too, for all the grown-ups who came to help us on our trip.



Year 1 – Dinosaur Planet

In Year 1 we have been infatuated with our "Dinosaur Planet" theme during this half term.

Using our historical timeline, we learned that dinosaurs existed during the Mesozoic era, which started more than 200 million years ago—a period of time when there were no humans at all! We learnt about the Triassic, Jurassic, and Cretaceous periods and how the world changed from one super continent called Pangea, to the seven continents we know today. Some of us found it rather sad that we would never get to meet a real dinosaur, because they are extinct, but we had a great time learning what experts think could have happened to the dinosaurs all those millions of years ago. In History, we have also learnt all about the famous fossil collector and palaeontologist, Mary Anning. She is remembered today as one of the greatest fossil hunters to have ever lived and continues to inspire people with her spectacular finds in the Natural History Museum; many of us were excited to share that we had seen these before when we visited London! We were lucky enough to have a very special visitor, who brought in lots of amazing fossils for us to explore!



It was so much fun, and we got to pretend to be palaeontologists and dig in the sand to excavate the fossils.



In Art we have been using clay to mould and shape our own dinosaur sculptures, looking carefully at the different dinosaur features and using tools to add texture and details to our models.





In English, we have created information books and included some fascinating dinosaur facts that we had found from a range of non-fiction sources. Did you know the Argentinosaurus was thought to be the biggest dinosaur to ever exist? We have also been enjoying our fiction unit, looking at the story, 'Land of the Dinosaurs'. We used role-play to act out the different parts of the story and have been practising using adjectives to help add description to our sentences to make them more exciting. It has been such a busy, fun filled half term! Well done everyone for working so hard, we are all very proud of you and everything you have achieved!

Year 2 – Muck, Mess and Mixtures

Year 2 have had an enormous amount of fun

diving into their Muck, Mess and Mixtures theme. This of course began with our annual Messy Day which many have already labelled their favourite day of the year so far. There was a slime a workshop, lava lamps and of course, the crowd favourite, Coke and Mentos experiment.



This really helped to get the children engaged and we saw this during our lessons exploring different materials and how they behave. In Maths, we got to grips with fractions and have explored measure. Moreover, in English, after completing a recount on the Messy Day described above, the children completed a new unit this year on the book 'Clean Up' by Nadia Shireen. Grappling with issues around plastic pollution from the perspective of a young girl was a perfect way to spark the interest in year 2 and the writing has been some of the best so far.



We can't wait for all the fun to come in Summer 1.

Year 3 - Nutrition

This half term Year Three have been learning all about nutrition and the importance of a balanced diet.



We kicked off the work by making individual rainbow cupcakes which required a lot of collaboration and careful following of instructions.

In our Science lessons, we soon learned that whilst the cakes were delicious, we

shouldn't indulge too frequently as unfortunately they are high in fat and sugar. Thankfully we also discovered that fats and oils should be included in a balanced diet so we could excuse the treat on this occasion! Our focus on healthy food extended into our Computing lessons where we created vlogs that discussed and shared healthy alternatives to some of our favourite treats such as hotdogs or pancakes.

Within our D&T lessons this half term, we applied our scientific knowledge on nutrition to inform our design and creation of a healthy pizza which used a tortilla as the base.



We then thought carefully about the toppings that we would use to ensure that our pizzas were nutritionally balanced but also delicious!



We have loved this theme (particularly the food tasting!) but are now looking forward to our Running Rivers unit after Easter!

Year 4 – Hooke Court

Year 4 have had an exceptionally busy half term studying our 'Traders and Raiders' theme. We picked up our history learning from the collapse of the Roman empire and followed the rise and fall of the Anglo-Saxons, Vikings and ended with the Norman conquest of 1066 and its impacts on English language and culture. In Science we've been studying sound; how it's made, how it travels and the difference between pitch and volume. However, the highlight of our half term was undoubtedly our residential trip to Hooke Court.



The children represented themselves and the school outstandingly well. They truly enriched their Norman learning as well as developing key skills of independence, resilience

and collaboration. Well done Year 4!

Year 5 – Zoo Lab

This half term, Year 5 have been learning about living things and their habitats in our Science and Geography units.

We had a visit from Zoo Lab who are animal handling experts where we learned about many different animals and how they are adapted to their environments. For example, the hissing cockroach which is capable of surviving a variety of different natural disasters due to its hard exoskeleton and the corn snake whose scales are an almost perfect match to camouflage with its surroundings.



So many of the children bravely held different creatures and we learned that the slime produced by African Land Snails is actually good for your skin!



We have been able to use what we learned in our workshop and our science lessons to create our own fantasy beasts in our English writing, both in narratives and non-chronological reports. Additionally, we have been creating wire sculptures in our Art lessons based upon different minibests that we have studied. I am sure many of our parents will look forward to seeing our artistic efforts.

Miss Swinfield, leading by example, also braved handling an array of creepy crawlies. She would like to attest that she was not quite as relaxed as she looks while holding the corn snake!



Year 6 – Down House

To support our learning of our theme 'Darwin's Discoveries,' we visited Down House - Charles Darwin's family home - and were able to explore the rooms where he lived and worked, including the study where he wrote *On the Origin of the Species*.



The house was surprisingly big for the time so it was obvious that he had lots of money! The house is surrounded by beautiful gardens that acted as Darwin's 'living laboratory' and we were shown recreated experiments which enabled Darwin to develop his ground-breaking theories. One theory that we learnt about was the 'theory of evolution.' When Darwin first sailed the Galapagos islands, he collected specimens of the animals which he came across. Among these were finches - he noticed that the beaks of

the finches varied from island to island and found that this was because they had evolved to suit the different food types available to the finches on each island. To further help us understand his theory, we conducted an experiment using chopsticks, tweezers and pegs as replica beaks, and rubber worms, rice and seeds as replica food.



Down Syndrome Awareness Week

Last week a group of parents came in to raise awareness within the school around Down's Syndrome.

The group of parents spent the week speaking to the children and running workshops to highlight some of the areas that those with the condition can find difficult through a range of different exercises. To end the week, they delivered a fun and

engaging assembly to our KS1 where they got to learn more about their peers.



We would like to say a massive thank you to the group of parents for all their hard work in organising this.

PTFA Guess the Egg Competition – Winners

SCHOOL COUNCIL NEWS & UPDATES




Our school council have been busy at work this year continuing to support further improvements across the school.
