Being safe online

We know the keeping safe online is important. For example, the games and apps we use often have an age limit or advised age for a good reason. For example, internet matters tells us that;

"Fortnite has a PEGI (Pan European Game Information) rating of 12, PEGI have said this is due to the: 'frequent scenes of mild violence. It is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age'.

This PEGI rating only takes into account the content in the game and not the contact element, where players may be exposed to swearing and offensive language from strangers, either through audio or on-screen text chat.

As Fortnite is an online game you will play against players of different ages from across the world. You cannot choose who you play against."

1. Little People, Big Dreams: Steve Jobs, Ada Lovelace

In these books from the critically acclaimed, multimillion-copy bestselling Little People, BIG DREAMS series, discover the life of Steve Jobs, the visionary whose ideas still shape the world, or Ada Lovelace, the first computer programmer.

2. Troll Stinks! By Jeanne Willis and Tony Ross

Billy Goat and his best friend Cyril are messing about with the farmer's mobile phone, taking selfies and playing games . . . until they find the number for a troll. Their Grandpa Gruff says trolls are bad, so Billy and Cyril decide to get their own back by sending mean messages. After all, trolls really do stink! This book helps younger readers understand how trolling and unkind words can affect someone, even through a computer screen.

3. Hacker by Malorie Blackman

A cyber-crime thriller from the former Children's Laureate Malorie Blackman. Vicky's father is sent to jail for stealing a large sum of money from the bank and she sets about to prove that he is innocent. Using her brilliant computer skills, Vicky decides to hack into the bank computer files to find evidence of the truth about the real thief.
