We are such fantastic storytellers now in Nursery!


Reception – Can I be an Author?


This term in Reception, we have been answering the question 'Can I be an Author?' We began our learning by researching what authors and illustrators are. We now know that authors are someone who writes the book, and an illustrator is someone who draws the pictures.


We looked at a wide range of different stories and looked carefully at the characters, key problems and events. resolutions that occur. We learnt to retell 'Cinderella' and 'Hansel and Gretel' off by heart by using our 'talk for writing' actions to help us remember the stories. We know fairy tales and traditional tales use story language like 'once upon a time' and 'they lived happily ever after'.


We had lots of fun writing our own stories using our imagination, making sure our stories had a beginning, middle and end.











Your child will bring their story home to share with you! We even used 'Kung Fu' punctuation to help us to know where our sentences start and finish, trying hard to remember to use finger spaces and the tricky words we know to help to make our writing even better. The children learnt to link their ideas using different sentence starters. What super authors we are!

Year 1 – Enchanted Woodland

This half term we have had so much fun with our 'Enchanted Woodland' theme. We got to look after our very own caterpillars and watch them form their chrysalis. They then started their clever process of transforming into a butterfly! We learnt that this process is called metamorphosis. Eventually, we discovered we had beautiful butterflies in our butterfly garden, and later went to release them on the field next to lots of nettles and flowers; it was so much fun! We knew they were 'Painted Ladies' because we had done lots of research on the

computers about different types of butterflies - most of us decided our favourite was the 'Blue Morpho', because it's such a bright colour! Did you know it is one of the largest butterflies in the world and lives in tropical climates?





In Science, we have been exploring trees. We know there are different types of trees - some are deciduous, and some are evergreen. We also went on a tree hunt and collected different types of leaves. We used our magnifying glasses to observe them and identified what trees they had come from. This half term we have also loved growing our very own

sunflowers and have learnt about the different parts of a plant and the jobs that they do. We now have them at home and can't wait to see how tall they grow!

In Geography, we have been exploring maps and looking at the different symbols we might find on a map and why they are useful. It was so exciting to create our own fantasy map with a key!

In English, we have enjoyed getting very creative being story tellers. We made up our very own fantasy stories using our imaginations. We explored mythical characters and magical settings, and 'magpied' ideas that we wanted to use, to make our stories exciting. Our teachers were so impressed and lots of us have said we would love to be authors when we grow up!

We were also very lucky this half term and got to go on a special school trip to Tilgate Park. Here, we explored the Nature Centre and got to meet lots of different animals. Lots of us said the meerkats were our favourites because they were very cheeky and looked funny sunbathing in the sand! Our workshop about different types of animals taught us lots of interesting facts, and some of us were lucky enough to hold some of the reptiles! We even got to see two pancake

tortoises, maple and syrup, race each other. They were both very slow! We then had lots of fun getting lost in the giant maze with all of our friends and later had a chance to explore the walled garden, where we used all of our scientific knowledge that we had recently learnt in school to discuss what we could see. It was a busy day, and we all had such a lovely time! \odot

Year 2 – Wriggle and Crawl

It's been a busy half term for Year 2 this Summer 1. Of course, we must begin by congratulating them for their enormous efforts in their SATs week, where they showed a new level of maturity to overcome the challenge. We are so proud of them! Beyond this, the children have been exploring life cycles in their science unit, whilst comparing the needs of different animals, including humans.

In geography, the children have looked closely at climates in continents and countries and have compared the landscape and climate of Madagascar with that of the UK. There have been many favoured memories, from bug hunts on the field to a King's coronation themed treasure hunt, and we can't wait to make more in Summer 2.

Year 3 – Running Rivers

This half term, Year Three have been learning all about plants and rivers in our and science geography centred theme, 'Running Rivers.' During our Science lessons, we learnt all about plants and how to care and in for them our Geography lessons, we learnt about rivers with a particular focus on our local river, the Wandle. Did you know that during the Victorian Times, the Wandle was deemed one of the hardest working rivers in the world!?

Our first external visit took place this half term where we spent the day in Grove Park. During this trip, we painted pictures of the river using watercolours and explored the plants and wildlife in the park.





We also undertook our first Geography fieldwork project in which we were researching the levels of rubbish in the park. To our great disappointment, there was a lot discarded rubbish throughout the area despite the many bins provided. The children were so incensed by litter that they insisted that we picked it up - We filled a whole bin bag with rubbish!

Along with our work in class this half term, we have also been very excited to begin our lessons Diembe on Tuesday. We've been having lots of fun learning rhythms and all about the history of the drums and where thev originated from. We can't wait to continue next half term and perform to an audience at the summer fayre.

Year 4 – Burps, Bottoms and Bile

Year 4 had a very exciting half term of learning in Summer 1 around our 'Burps, Bottoms and Bile' theme. In Science, we learnt about the human digestive system and how our

food is converted into energy for our bodies. We had an exciting visit (pictured) where the children got nice and messy creating their own models of the entire digestive system! In Geography, we focused on the United Kingdom and learning about how the names and geographical features vary in different parts of our country. In English, the children wrote very engaging science-fiction narratives about a scientist who gets shrunk and lost in the digestive system. Watch out for those at Exhibition Evening!

Year 5 - France Trip

On day 1, we all woke up to a great start since we were going to France. We drove to Dover and got on the ferry (the view of the white cliffs was spectacular). Next, we got on the coach and went to a snail farm! We tried lots of themed foods before heading to Poppies Hotel to get some rest. A few of us were too excited to sleep! The next day, we walked around the town to the museum, but not before getting a picture with the Golden Statue. After some yummy lunch (French baguettes) we set off for Belgium. We were lucky enough to stop off at Tyne Cot memorial (the largest British WW1 cemetery).



After learning the history and locating many fallen soldierssome even from Carshaltonwe headed off to the Menin Gate.



Whilst waiting for the last post ceremony, we visited a Belgium chocolate shop-Yum! On day 3, we went to Amiens Cathedral where Mr Brooker led a tour on all of the spectacular architecture.



Next, another war memorial before heading to some trenches. It was а true experience to stand where soldiers once did and imagine the battles. We had to cherish the next day as it was our last. We visited a market and bought many things but most importantly, lots of sweets! Then, we crossed the channel again on a turbulent trip. Finally we arrived home for a good night rest, we were exhausted from all the fun!


Wider News

MOVING UP TO SECONDARY SCHOOL

Ofcom's 2022 research into technology use across the UK has shown that nearly all 13 – 15-year-olds (98%) have their own phone. For most of these young people, they were given their phones around the start of secondary school, between the ages of 9 and 11 (91%). If you are considering getting your child their first phone, there are lots of factors to consider. Childnet's 'First Phone Checklist' is a great, easy to understand resource that takes you through the process of choosing the right time, setting it up and supporting your child.
