


History: Castles & Castle Life

What makes a castle a castle?	Castles are a type of home whose main job was to protect the people inside from invaders.	
How are castles different from homes we live in today?	Castles are much bigger than most houses today and lots of people lived in them. Our houses are designed for comfort. A castle's main job was to protect the people inside safe from attack.	
Where might I find a castle in the UK?	There are castles all over the United Kingdom. When building castles, people tended to pick high places close to water.	
Who lived in castles and what was their life like?	People who lived in the castle included lords, who were in charge, as well as soldiers to defend it from enemy invaders, and even cooks and cleaners to keep everyone fed and tidy up.	
What different types of castle are there?	There are three main types of castle: motte and bailey castle, the stone keep castle, and the concentric castle.
